FACT SHEET -- YOUTH CHAMBER ORCHESTRA

THE ORCHESTRA The Youth Chamber Orchestra is a youth project of the Oakland Symphony in cooperation with the high schools of the Greater East Bay area. Its purpose is to acquaint the high-school age musician with the large repertoire of chamber orchestra literature in performances of high artistic excellence.

The Oakland Symphony originally sponsored a high school honor orchestra, but reduced the group to a chamber orchestra in the fall of 1964, for, as Maestro Samuel said, 'While there are many good youth symphonic organizations in the area, there is no chamber orchestra."

THE CONDUCTOR Robert Hughes, the conductor of the Youth Chamber Orchestra, is also the Assistant Conductor of the Oakland Symphony, the San Francisco Ballet and the Cabrillo Music Festival and appears frequently as guest conductor through the state. He is an accomplished bassoonist and contra-bassoonist, performing with the Oakland Symphony, San Francisco Ballet, Mills Performing Group, the California Wind Quintet and other local organizations. As a composer, he has studied with Lou Harrison, Carlos Chavez, Leon Kirchner and Luigi Dallapiccola. His compositions have been performed by the Oakland Symphony, San Francisco Ballet, orchestras in Santa Cruz and Fresno and many Bay Area chamber ensembles.

PERFORMANCES In its first season, the orchestra gave 3 performances, which by last year had grown to 9 performances, including a four-day tour. Its performances are broadcast over Pacifica Radio Station KPFA and, this year, will also be broadcast by Station KKHI. It has also appeared on television locally.

Tapes of all concerts and a lp record of highlight selections are available for auditioning. Also available is a four-minute, 16-mm sound film of the orchestra at work.

During the spring of last year the orchestra won a performing position at the California Music Educator's convention in Santa Barbara and developed its appearance there into a small tour, beginning with a performance in San Francisco at the Statler-Hilton hotel, continuing to Santa Barbara and finishing with a performance at Cabrillo College in Santa Cruz. In the course of the tour, the students received guided historical tours of the Santa Barbara Mission and the old Spanish quarter, the Hearst Castle at San Simeon and dined at the famous Nepenthe Restaurant in Big Sur, as well as on a fishing boat on the waters of Monterey Bay.

The Youth Chamber Orchestra serves as a training ground for the Oakland Symphony Orchestra. Many members of the orchestra have graduated into the big orchestra with full professional status. Also, during their period of service with the Youth Chamber Orchestra and during the last 3 years, 7 of the members of the Youth Chamber Orchestra have appeared as soloists both with the Oakland Symphony and the San Francisco Symphony. In order to be accepted into the Youth Chamber Orchestra, the youngster must be enrolled in his own school orchestra or band and the application to audition for the Youth Chamber Orchestra is signed by his instrumental music teacher.

REPERTOIRE Due to the chamber nature of the orchestra, most of the repertoire is pre-nineteenth century or from the modern literature. This has given participating students the opportunity to perform and know intimately music not generally encountered until college or professional years.

The programming has included such diverse and difficult pieces as Stravinsky's "Orpheus," "The Fairy's Kiss" and "History of a Soldier;" Dallapiccola's 12-tone "Cinque Frammenti di Saffo;" Aaron Copland's Clarinet Concerto and the American premiere of Darius Milhaud's "Les Quatre Elements," all from the modern repertoire. As well as the classical masters Mozart, Haydn and Bach, the orchestra performs lesser known 17th and 18th century masters such as Francesco Durante and Karl von Dittersdorf. Its upcoming December 11 concert includes half a program of seldom-heard contemporary Mexican music. Composers such as Aaron Copland and Lou Harrison have kindly devoted time to coach the musicians.

For the 1967 spring concert on April 9, the Youth Chamber Orchestra has commissioned eminent American composer Ned Rorem to compose for it a Concerto Grosso featuring the violin and clarinet. This composition will also be published by Boosey and Hawkes and, after the first performance, will be available for general public performances.

REVIEWS There has been unanimous enthusiastic response to all of the orchestra's performances. The San Francisco Chronicle (Sept. 13, 1964) referred to it as "the new chamber orchestra of the young, elite musicians." Attached are two complete reviews, one from the Oakland Tribune and one from the Watsonville Register-Pajaronian.

PARTICIPATION IN OAKIAND SYMPHONY ACTIVITIES To encourage the close relationship between the parent symphony and the youth organization, the Oakland Symphony hosts the Youth Chamber Orchestra players each year at several Oakland Symphony concerts and at various social activities.

Another "First" for the YCO . . .

The April 9th concert will present the premiere of "Water Music," a Concerto Grosso for Violin, Clarinet and Small Orchestra, by Ned Rorem, one of America's foremost composers. Commissioned by the YCO in the Spring of 1966 the new work will soon be published and bear a dedication to the orchestra.

Ned Rorem, frequently sighted as "America's most gifted song composer," has an equally impressive reputation for his chamber and symphonic music, much of which is recorded and available on LP. His two books, "The Paris Diary of Ned Rorem" and "Music from Inside Out", will soon be followed by another volume of autobiography. His colorful life, glamorous and clandestine, spanning three continents and a brief 44 years is already the subject of a current movie.

Mr. Rarem, also a brilliant planist, was chosen for the commission not only because of his great melodic gift (so apparent in the "tune" of "Water Music"!) but also for his ability to write music technically demanding of the soloists (for example — Variation 1, at the beginning of the piece). Thomas Halpin and Larry London, the two distinguished young soloists featured in the work, are both seniors and in their final year with the orchestra. In considering repertoire the conductor discovered that no "double concerto" existed featuring their instruments — though there are some famous chamber music pieces for the combination — and it is hoped the new Rorem work will fill that deficiency.

The program includes Haydn's "Hornsignal" Symphony — made possible by YCO's brilliant horn section, a rare 18th Century trumpet work by Hummel (with Jack Sadey), and two masterpieces by Griffes (with Maki Kuper) and Virgil Thomson which join with the Rorem work to present an American panarama.

Another "Second" for the YCO . . .

After the very successful San Francisco-Santa Barbara-San Simeon-Santa Cruz tour last year another "tour" was inevitable! Armed with such excitement as soloist Gita Karasic in the Ravel Concerto and the new Rorem commission the YCO will embark on its second annual tour on May 5th and include performances in Vancouver, B.C., Seattle, Portland, and Northern California.

Another "Third" for the YCO . . .

The third season adds many new concerts to the above schedule, including an hour long "prime-time" color TV broadcast on Channel 4 KRON-TV and a season's end "POP ART" concert featuring an internationally famous popular soloist. THE GENESIS OF A COMPOSITION

When Robert Hughes took the leadership of the Youth Chamber Orchestra three years ago he was initially impressed by two gifted sophomores, performers on violin and clarinet. The admiration has steadily grown and so have their talents. In contemplating repertoire for their final year with the orchestra it was discovered that no major concertante work existed featuring violin and clarinet—a very likely combination with major examples in chamber music literature. A bright possibility presented itself—a new work to fill the vacancy in the repertoire, a "premiere" written especially for YCO, and a way to celebrate the artistic devotion, hard work and accomplishment of the two exemplar young musicians. The orchestra added two extra concerts to its schedule in the spring and summer of 1966 to raise the money for the commission.

After spending much of their young lives perfecting the technical mastery of their instruments a work was needed that would tax the salient abilities of the two soloists. By happy coincidence Ned Rorem was visiting the Bay Area at the time all this was being contemplated. The perfect solution—here was a composer of international reputation who has written technically brilliant music, colorful orchestration, and possesses one of the finest melodic gifts. He accepted the invitation, studied carefully the situation and makeup of each section of the YCO, wrote the piece in New York City and at Yaddo between September and December of 1966, and arranged publication, with a dedication to the orchestra, by Boosey and Hawkes Music Publishers.

"Water Music" is a "concerto grosso" featuring not only the soloists but every section of the orchestra. The composer intended to give each section a "watery" title but lack of time has prevented the final decision. Here are the possibilities for a "program" for those who want it!



ROBERT HUGHES is the Assistant Conductor of the Oakland Symphony, San Francisco Ballet and Cabrillo Music Festival, A student of Lou Harrison, Luigi Dallapiccola, Carlos Chavez and Lean Kirchner, his compositions are frequently performed — the most recent successes being a ballet based on the Kama Sutra and his "Elegy for Vietnam followed by a Protest." In addition he holds principal positions in the Bay Area as a bassoonist and controbassoonist.

Seattle, Portland and Eureka, Many well known soloists have appeared with them and their repertoire stretches from ancient Aztec music to the most recent avant-garde experiments.

- THOMAS HALPIN has been soloist with the San Francisco Symphony and the Youth Chamber Orchestra. He was a scholarship winner to the Congress of Strings and has also performed in the Cabrillo Music Festival.
- LARRY LONDON has been soloist with the Oakland Symphony, the Youth Chamber Orchestra and the College of Holy Names. A student of avant-garde composer Morton Subotnick in both clarinet and composition, he has also played with the Mills Performing Group under Luciano Berio. The press has said of him: "Larry London must be heard to be believed. One dislikes to use the much abused word 'genius' but this is one young musician to whom it applies."
- MAQUETTE KUPER has been flute soloist with Bay Area orchestras in Oakland and Berkeley and will enter the University of California at Berkeley next fall.
- JACK SADEY has won many prizes in local and state music competitions.

 He is a junior and will perform with the orchestra again next year.

program notes

NED ROREM WATER MUSIC

In the spring of 1966 the Youth Chamber Orchestra commissioned Ned Rorem to write a new work for chamber orchestra featuring the talents of its two seniors, Thomas Halpin on violin and Larry London on clarinet. No such "double concerto" exists in the literature and Rorem was the perfect choice to fill the vacancy due to his technically brilliant style, colorful orchestration and, as a song composer of international reputation, his great melodic gift. A celebrated premiere took place in Oakland on April 12, 1967, and the work is being published, with a dedication to the orchestra, by Boosey and Hawkes.

Each variation has been supplied with a "watery" title too lengthy to reproduce here, but which might best be described (in succession) as: Waves, Pond, Spray, Rapids, Mud Puddle, Stagnant Water, The Depths, Dew, Lakes.

JOSEPH HAYDN . . . SYMPHONY No. 31 IN D "HORNSIGNAL"

Written for performance at the Esterházy court in 1765 the "Hornsignal" Symphony was provided by its young composer with a liberal concertante element centered about the formidable horn parts which appear in every movement; but Haydn, with his usual graceful humanity, also provides lovely extended solos for the solo violin, flute and cello. The four movements are models of character — energy, grace, elegance, and variety.

MAURICE RAVEL . CONCERTO IN G FOR PIANO AND ORCHESTRA

The "Concerto in G" of 1931 was Ravel's last large work before he entered the tragic period of decline leading to his death in 1937. Breathtaking demands upon the pianist, the incredible originality of the orchestration (consider just the unique introduction with frusta, piccolo, polytonal piano and then bravura trumpet into the mellowing first piano theme!), sudden and wild shifts in imagination (the E flat clarinet at the beginning of the 3rd Mvt.!) and the new influence of jazz evidence Ravel's genius. Almost as a last will and testament this composer who gave the world so much unique, enchanting, sensuous music, created a brilliant concerto of dazzling virtuosity, wit and humor, technical daring and, in the case of the slow movement, utter loveliness.

VIRGIL THOMSON . . . SUITE FROM THE "LOUISIANA STORY"

Virgil Thomson, like Ned Rorem, considers Paris his second home (New York is first for both). In the work on today's program Thomson's French influence is mainly found in the orchestration. His music for the Robert Flaherty film "Louisiana Story" uses authentic Louisiana Acadian music (e.g.—2nd Mvt. "Chorale") to represent the people of the film but uses "musical devices adapted from Mendelssohn, Debussy, and other landscape composers" (V.T.) to depict natural scenery (as in the 1st Mvt. "Bayou"). The powerful 4th movement Fugue provides "action" music for the film. The music dates from 1948.

CHARLES GRIFFES POEM FOR FLUTE AND ORCHESTRA

Since Debussy France, Paris and master teachers like Nadia Boulanger have attracted a whole school of 20th Century American composers. Charles Griffes (1884-1920), born in Elmira, New York, travelled briefly as a student in Europe but settled in Tarrytown, New York, where he taught and composed music influenced by the recent European styles. His "Poem for Flute and Orchestra" of 1918 is a highly successful blend of French impressionistic and Oriental influences yet stamped by Griffes' individualism through its lovely flow and rubato and simple yet strong form.

SILVESTRE REVUELTAS . HOMENAJE A FEDERICO GARCIA LORCA

Mexico is so immediately attractive in its exotic and picturesque ways that we often forget that its contemporary artistic flowerings are based upon a long and often tragic history. Silvestre Revueltas (1899-1940), one of Mexico's most interesting and profound musical

figures, grew from a poor Mexican Indian family as a self-trained violinist into a touring virtuoso, eventually migrated to America to conduct theatre orchestras in Texas and Alabama and finally, at age 32, returned to Mexico to take up composition and produce 25 remarkable works in the remaining eight years of his short life. Like the famous Italian condottiere, Federigo Montefeltro, he was a big man and bore an enormous scar from lip to ear as a result of an early fight; like Dylan Thomas he died of liquor, and like the Spanish poet, Lorca, he had a great sympathy for the people. His "Homenaje", composed in 1936, might easily have taken inspiration from the lines in Lorca's poem "Alma Ausente":

"I sing for later times your profile . .

... the sadness that lay in your valiant gaiety ..." CHARLES BOONE ETUDE FOR ALICIA KRISTINA

Charles Boone is coordinator of the Mills Performing Group and the Tape Music Center at Mills College in Oakland and is the composer of avant-garde scores. Written for and premiered by the Youth Chamber Orchestra in the spring of this year "Etude" is composed in new notational systems including graphs and aleatoric features characteristic of the latest developments in contemporary music.

JOH. NEPOMUK HUMMEL . CONCERTO A TROMBA PRINCIPALE

Hummel succeeded Haydn as Kepallmeister at the Esterházy court and wrote his Trumpet Concerto in 1804 as one of his first works for the new position. Like the Haydn Symphony it recalls the fine brass players available at the court and also, with its impeccable classic style and gay spirit, the flamboyant Baroque custom of screnading royalty with trumpet and kettledrum at their splendid social gatherings.
